OUR STORY

Rabata was founded in 2011 with the goal of creating positive cultural change through creative educational experiences. This 501(c)3 nonprofit organization serves Muslim women and everyone they lead through its three areas of programming: education, spirituality, and community.

The Ribaat Academic Institute is part of the educational wing of Rabata and offers women a comprehensive curriculum in Islamic Sciences, the Arabic language, and Tajwid of the Holy Quran. Ribaat certifies traditionally trained scholars and da'iyas who are prepared to lead and educate others, and also offers independent classes for those not seeking certification. The language of instruction is English and students range from 17-70 years of age and beyond.

Ribaat combines a rigorous curriculum of Islamic studies with courses on such topics as current affairs, teaching methodologies, and pastoral care, all taught by qualified female scholars. In this way, Ribaat graduates women who are equipped to serve their communities both Islamically and professionally.

Through Ribaat's online classes, women are reconnecting with their faith and reclaiming their traditionally-held leadership roles in Islamic scholarship, mentorship, and community care.

What we offer at Ribaat Academic Institute is a gradual process of intellectual growth and spiritual development that will provide women with a solid knowledge of their religion and a strong moral compass, preparing them to take part in the upliftment of women, children, youth, and society.

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Over 3,500 women representing 55 countries are learning and growing with Ribaat. We began with 180 students in a pilot course in 2012, and have grown into a powerful force for positive culture change offering over 130 academic courses per year.

The year 2020 marked a milestone in Ribaat's history, as the first cohort of 17 students graduated with the Ribaat Teacher Certification. This cohort continues to work towards the Ribaat Scholar Certification, as other cohorts follow their lead.

RIBAAT ACADEMIC TRACKS

Aqida - AQD:

Aqida is the foundational study of creed or faith and covers the six pillars of faith: God, the angels, the revealed books, the messengers, the Final Day, and divine destiny.

Arabic - ARA:

The Ribaat Arabic Program provides a comprehensive curriculum for non-Arabic speakers designed to develop students' reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills in the Arabic language.

Certification Requirements - CRT:

Ribaat certification requirements are required courses for students who are seeking certification. They include orientation courses, seminars, oral assessments, thesis projects, and discussion, as well as in-person retreats to ensure a solid, well-rounded understanding of the concepts learned and an ability to apply them practically.

Communications - COM:

Communications is the study of how to effectively write, speak, and deliver a message. Communication studies provide students with the necessary skills to be effective teachers, community leaders, and changemakers.

Education - EDU:

Education courses ground students in pedagogical theory, modern educational methodology, and best teaching practices. They also provide the developmental knowledge needed to access students at each age with a background of some of the issues that may be faced when working with them.

Figh - FQH:

Figh is the study of codified Islamic law (jurisprudence) according to a specific madhhab. The study of figh is divided into two primary subject areas: the figh of worship and the figh of deeds. The figh of worship includes matters of purity, prayer, fasting, pilgrimage, and mandatory charity (zakat). The figh of deeds includes social, political, and economic matters of life.

Hadith - HAD:

Hadith is the study of the sunnah, behavior, words, and deeds of the Prophet Muhammad (sallallahu 'alayhi wa sallam). Upper level courses go into the history of the compilation of hadith, narration, classification, and transmission.

History - HIS:

History is the study of past events of the earth, its peoples, civilizations, natural resources, and international relations. Ribaat history courses focus primarily on the history of the Muslim world and the diaspora, Muslim historical figures and movements, as well as the effect of global history on Muslim civilizations.

Purification - PUR:

Tazkiya is the study of how to purify the self. It includes the qualities of a believer, qualities of a disbeliever, and methods of identifying and treating diseases of the heart. Tazkiya teaches spiritual ethics and how to gain piety while living in the world in the manner of those who were and are beloved to God.

Sira - SIR:

Sira began as the documentation of the battles during the time of the Prophet Muhammad (sallallahu 'alayhi wa sallam) and grew into a complex compendium of his entire lived history. His life, relationships, manners, experiences, what he did and did not do, what he said – all add up to sira. His life is a blessed example of a lived Quran and how best to live on this earth.

Social Sciences - SSC:

Social Sciences at Ribaat encompass the study of social and cultural aspects of human relationships both individually and collectively within Muslim societies. This includes the study of Islamic cultures and societies through the lenses of anthropology, sociology, historiography, human geography, education, history, communications, and psychology.

Tafsir - TAF:

Tafsir is the exegesis of the Quran. It includes asbab al-nuzul, or the contextual reasons for the revelation of particular verses; grammatical points; an explanation of vocabulary; related hadiths or stories from the life of the Prophet (sallallahu 'alayhi wa sallam); commentary and lessons learned. Tafsir can be as simple as a translation of the Quran. A translator interprets the meaning and renders it into English; hence, it is a tafsir of the Quran more than it is the Quran itself.

Tajwid- TAJ:

Tajwid is a Quranic science that details the correct pronunciation of the letters of the Holy Quran, including points of articulation, letter attributes, duration of letters, mouth shape and letter fulfillment, as well as the rules of tajwid. Ribaat Tajwid courses enable students to become proficient in recitation of the Holy Quran, with complete understanding and application of the rules of tajwid.

ACADEMIC CERTIFICATION TRACKS

To earn the certification, students must complete all required courses with a passing grade. There is no time limit to complete a certification. The program is flexible to fit each student's individual circumstances.

LEVEL 1

SIR 101 & 102: Companions of the Prophet

An in-depth study of the sixty companions discussed in the book Stars in the Prophet's Orbit. Students will learn their stories, draw conclusions about Islamic precepts from their lives, understand their relationship to the Prophet , and derive personal lessons from their lives. Students will apply same to an additional companion upon whom research will be done. The first thirty companions of this text are covered in Part 1 of the course, and the second thirty are covered in Part 2. It is not required to complete part 1 before part 2.

PUR 101: Training the Tongue, Purifying the Heart

An introduction to the concept of tazkiyah, or purification of the self/heart in Islam. It is a beginning look at diseases of the heart and sins of the tongue as well as the relationship between the two. Students will learn some general cures and understand some of the skills necessary to improve relationships with others and with Allah (swt).

AQD 101: Foundations, Flounderings, & Faith

Belief and practice are the essential building blocks for Muslims and, as such, in order to build a fortress of faith, we need solid building materials. This course will cover basic 'aqīda (tenets of belief), discuss issues of practice, and attempt to answer controversial questions. We will build a community of faithful friends, quell the floundering heart, and revive the faithful heart.

TAF 101: Reflections from the Quran

This course takes students on a journey with the Quran, gain deeper understandings of its words and derive lessons from Allah's (swt) words. Each term, students will be guided through an in-depth study of a surah from the Holy Quran and reflect upon the lessons learned from its verses as they sit with one of our modern scholars of the Holy Quran. This term will cover Ash-Shu'ara', Al-Mu'minoon, Al-Furqān, and Al-Mujadala.

EDU 101: Teaching Skills & Methodology

This introductory level course provides aspiring and veteran teachers opportunities to learn and practice effective teaching strategies for students enrolled in Islamic Studies programs. During this course we will examine components of skillful teaching including deep learning, lesson planning, classroom management, nurturing the Prophetic model of emotional and moral intelligence, assessment, professionalism, and upbringing within an Islamic framework. Students will be expected to complete a midterm and final along with one course project.

FQH 101: Fast & Friendly Figh: An Introduction to Worship Essentials

A quick and fun introduction to Shafi'i fiqh for the beginner, this course will go over the main rules of worship, covering purification (ṭahāra), prayer (ṣalāh), and fasting (ṣawm).

HAD 102: Conversations with the Prophet

This course will explore selected hadith of the Prophet and conversations as reported by his companions (r). Through study of these hadith, students will learn prophetic etiquette in communicating with others and learn lessons to apply in daily life. They will also learn how the Prophet used kind and gentle words to guide others, communicate effectively, and build positive relationships.

AQD 103 & 104: The Prophets (as) Lives & Lessons

This course is designed to create an experience like no other by enhancing students' relationships with each of the prophets of Islam. From Prophet Adam (as) to Prophet Muhammad , the message of tawhid was brought to generations of believers by specially blessed individuals. Now we can get to know each of them and their unique challenges through in-depth lessons and thought-provoking exercises which will bring the legacy and history of Islam to life.

CRT 102 - Ribaat Retreat

The annual Ribaat Retreat is a unique opportunity for learning, deep spiritual growth, and enjoying the community of our beloved teachers and fellow students. Days are filled with lessons focusing on personal growth, worship, group activities, and face-to-face time with teachers. Evenings and nights are filled with worship, prayer, and Quran reading.

CRT 101: Orientation: Introduction to the Ribaat Teacher Certification

This course serves as the first step of the registration process into the Ribaat Teacher Certification Program. Through brief recordings and activities, the course forum will provide an introduction to the program as well as a platform for submitting the required documentation to enroll in the program. Completion of this course and all course activities is a requirement for earning the certification. They must be completed before graduation.

LEVEL 2

SIR 201 & 202: Lessons from the Life of the Prophet

This course will undertake a study of the life of the Prophet , with a special focus on his behavior and actions, providing a deeper understanding of why he was indeed "the chosen one". Students will examine the major events and minor incidents that took place in his public and private life, extrapolating the wisdom and lessons one can gain from them. Weekly assignments focus on these lessons learned, enabling students to draw parallels to modern day struggles in their own lives and make lasting changes, following in the footsteps of the Prophet

FQH 201 & 202: Fiqh al-Ibadat: al-Madhhab al-Shafi'i

An introduction to the foundation of Islamic law as the basis for a life of devotion and servitude to God. The student will learn about the reasons Islamic schools of law evolved and the nature and rationale of the legal schools. Students will learn the detailed rulings relating to purification (ṭahāra) and prayer (salat), fasting (ṣawm), alms-giving (zakat) and hajj, along with an examination of some of the textual proofs for those rulings. The class will also introduce the student to reading legal manuals in Arabic.

HAD 201 & 202: The Forty Hadith of Imam al-Nawawi

An in-depth study of the forty-hadith compilation of Imam al-Nawawī, this course is meant to provide students with a foundation in the hadith of the Prophet على The Prophet was given jawāmiʿ al-kalim (جوامع الكلم), or the ability to say much in very few words. The hadiths of the Prophet combine eloquence with deep, encompassing meanings in a uniquely simple way. This particular compilation was chosen because it includes ṣaḥīḥ hadiths, and it covers a variety of subjects.

By the end of this course, students will be able to understand, explain, and draw practical life lessons from the text of the forty hadiths in this compilation. The first twenty hadith are covered in Part 1 and the second twenty hadith are covered in Part 2.

AQD 201 & 202: Introduction to Islamic 'Aqīda

The development of 'aqīda in the heart and mind of the believer is the development of her way of life and the ability to communicate and spread the joy of faith to those around her. This course comprises an academic study of the tenets of Islamic belief, beginning in Part 1 with a study of the development of 'ilm al-kalām, a deep look into the meaning of tawḥīd (the Oneness of God), and a review of the messengers of Islam.

The course will continue in Part 2 with a detailed look at revelation, the unseen world, the Day of Judgment, and qaḍāʾ and qadr, concluding with a look at variant beliefs and some theological dimensions of law.

HIS 201: Mujaddidīn: Crises and Cures of Muslim History

A survey of the crises and trials that have challenged Islamic civilization over the centuries, along with an account of the Muslim "renewers" of the faith (mujaddidīn) whom Allah (swt) sent as a cure for each, and how they were able to overturn the current situation, renew the religion, and restore peace and faith to the Muslim ummah. Students will learn about the factors that contributed to each trial, how each mujaddid was able to overcome the trials of his time and gain an understanding of the characteristics that enabled each to succeed.

SSC 201: Understanding the Muslim World

This course will provide an overview of the human geography of the Muslim World, with an emphasis on cultural, historical, economic, and political geography. Utilizing a world-historical approach, the course will challenge students to rethink certain assumptions about the way the world is mapped, bounded, and defined. The central thesis guiding the course is the contention that the features we take for granted on the world map (continents, countries, directions, and borders) are more a product of various ethnocentrisms rooted in the ideologies that shaped the modern world rather than a reflection of natural and inherent divisions. A variety of materials will be assigned to explore this thesis, including a chronicle of the travels of Ibn Battuta, premodern maps, and scholarly articles highlighting key events and processes in the shaping of the premodern Muslim World.

TAF 201: Tafsir Juzu' 'Amma

In this course, students will take a journey with the Quran, gain deeper understandings of its words and derive lessons from Allah's (swt) words. Students will gain an understanding of the surahs within Juzu' Amma including the themes of the surahs, the reasons of revelation, lessons derived from them and linguistic background of specific words and phrases.

CRT 202: Oral Assessment - Ribaat Teacher Certification

Students who wish to graduate with the Ribaat Teacher Certification will be required to sit for an individual oral assessment. The assessment will be conducted by Dr. Tamara Gray, Rabata founder, Executive Director, and Chief Spiritual Officer. Dr. Gray will determine each student's level of competency and subject material proficiency based on the coursework she has completed. Students need to attain satisfactory results in this assessment to receive clearance for graduation.

LEVELS 3 & 4

TAF 301: 'Ulūm al-Quran: The Sciences of the Quran

An introduction to the sciences related to the Quran and its understanding. Students will learn about different definitions of the Quran and modes of revelation, the history of the written and oral text and its transmission, variant readings of the Quran (qira'at) and its miraculous nature (l'jaz). The second half of the fall semester will introduce the students to different aspects of knowledge that is related to the understanding of the Quranic text: the concept of abrogation (naskh), distinct and ambiguous verses (muhkam and mutashabihat), occasion of revelation (asbab al-nuzul), chronology of revelation, beginnings of Surahs. Excerpts and discussions stemming from contemporary scholarship on the Quran will be addressed as these are important to understand and deal with most of the controversies revolving around the Quran.

TAF 302: Tafsir of Selected Surahs

This course is an introduction to the study of tafsir. Sūrat al-Fātiḥah and other short chapters of the Quran will be studied in-depth. As students take a close look at the ways different mufassirūn have handled the interpretation of the same chapter, they will gain insight into the science of tafsir and how it has developed through the centuries and influenced various translations of the Quran. This course is a reading intensive course, as the genre of tafsir is probably one of the most productive in terms of volume within the scholarly canon.

Tafsīr: Formal Explanation of the Meanings of the Quran | Parts 1 - 4

In this course, we will identify the thematic division of each Surah while focusing on certain topics and their historical background in relation to the revelation of each Surah. We will concentrate on certain revelations that shaped the lives and the identity of the early Muslim community and try to apply to modern Muslim issues. Additionally, student will become familiar with key vocabulary and terms. This course is a 4-part course that takes students on an in-depth journey to understanding the Quran over 2 years.

HAD 301: Uṣūl al-Hadith: A Study of the Origins of the Sayings of the Prophet

The methodology of the expert scholars of hadith in assessing the narrations and sorting out the genuine from the mistaken and fabricated, form the subject matter of the science of hadith. In this course the students are introduced to this amazing methodology and the astonishing efforts of implementing it by the hadith scholars who were driven by the sacred motivation of preserving the honorable hadith.

FQH 301 & 302: Uṣūl al-Fiqh: Foundations of Fiqh

Usul al-Fiqh has always occupied a prominent place in the teaching curricula of Islamic institutions of legal learning. As a discipline of shari'a, Usul al-Fiqh is concerned with the sources of Islamic law, their order of priority, and the methods by which legal rules may be deduced from the source materials of the shari'a. It is also concerned with regulating the exercise of ijtihad.

This course offers an advanced study of Usul al-Fiqh in which the students will be introduced to the legislative sources of Islamic Law, rules of interpretation, and the methodology used by the jurist to produce the rules of figh.

Sira: An Academic Study of the Life of Prophet Muhammad ﷺ | Parts 1 - 4

An in-depth study of the life of Prophet Muhammad Part 1 provides a detailed study of the political and social layout of the Arabian Peninsula before Islam. It concludes with Prophet Muhammad's birth and the events of his life up until the revelation. Throughout Part 2, students examine in detail the major events and incidents that took place up until the hijra to Medina, extrapolating the wisdom and lessons one can gain from them. In Part 4, students are guided through the Prophet's life and call to Islam after the hijra.

HIS 301: Major Muslim Scholars: Women

This course will cover the lives and achievements of various women throughout Islamic history. The course will introduce a number of women from different eras and continents, starting from the time of the companions and moving to the present day. Students will be guided through a study of what it meant to be a Muslim scholar and leader, and how these women shaped lives, minds, and society.

CRT 301: Ribaat Scholar Certification

An orientation course into the Ribaat Scholar Certification Program, this course serves as the first step of the registration process into the certification program. Through brief recordings and activities, the course forum will provide an introduction to the program as well as a platform for submitting the required documentation to enroll in the program. Completion of this course is a requirement for earning the certification, and all course activities must be completed before graduation.

TAJWID

TAJ 103: Quran Fluency | Part 1

A practical course providing students the opportunity to practice reading the Holy Quran and master the skill of decoding. Students will learn the Baghdadi method of decoding Quranic script, learn the types of Arabic sounds and how to pronounce them correctly, and be introduced to the science of tajwīd. These skills will be put into practice in class with the instructor, and students will gain strategies to practice at home. By the end of this course, students should be able to recognize all the Arabic letters and vowel sounds with ease and be able to pronounce most of them correctly while improving their general speed and fluency while reading.

TAJ 201: Tajwid Part 1: Letters & Phonetics

A study of the science of tajwīd accompanied by an instructor-led recitation of Juz' 'Amma. This is a two-part course:

1) Students will gain an understanding of introductory tajwīd concepts (including points of articulation – makhārij – and letter attributes – Şifāt) during weekly online sessions with the instructor.

2) Students will work with a recitation teacher in small groups during 2 additional weekly sessions in which they will practice the theory learned in class. This part of the course will be complete when the student has demonstrated the ability to read Juz' Amma and pronounce each letter correctly.

TAJ 202 – Tajwid Part 2: Rules & the Rhythm of Recitation

Building upon concepts taken in TAJ 201, students will complete the study of the rules of tajwīd, accompanied by an instructor-led recitation of Juz' Tabarak. This is a two-part course:

1) Students will gain an understanding of the rules of tajwīd (proper pronunciation of the Holy Quran) during weekly online sessions with the instructor.

2) Students will work with a recitation teacher in small groups during 2 additional weekly sessions in which they will practice the theory learned in class. This part of the course will be complete when the student has demonstrated the ability to read Juz' Tabarak and pronounce each letter correctly.

TAJ 203 - Accelerated Tajwid Rules

A fast-paced review of tajwid rules for those who have mastered the practice of recitation and need to learn or relearn the theory. In this course, students will gain an understanding of all tajwid concepts (including points of articulation – makhārij – and letter attributes – Ṣifāt, proper pronunciation of the Holy Quran) during weekly online sessions with the instructor.

TAJ 301 - Khitmah Project

In the Khitmah Project, students will recite the Holy Quran from beginning to end to their assigned tajwid instructors, as a preparation and foundation for beginning with memorization. This is a two-part course:

1) Students will attend a weekly online session with the instructor to follow up on their progress, work together to achieve consistent Quran reading habits, and receive inspirations about the Holy Quran.

2) Each student will be paired with a certified tajwid teacher online, with whom she will work one-on-one. This part of the course will be complete when the student has read through the Holy Quran from start to finish with her assigned tajwid teacher, having demonstrated the ability to apply the rules of tajwid to the standardized and acceptable level.

TAJ 401: The Crowning Venture: Quran Memorization

A self-paced memorization course, students will set a personal memorization target each term and recite to

a tajwid teacher. This is a two-part course: Students will attend a weekly online session with the instructor to follow up on their progress and receive inspirations and tips on memorizing the Holy Quran, achieving effective memorization, and overcoming hurdles. Each student will be paired with a certified tajwid teacher, either online or locally, with whom she will work one-on-one. This part of the course will be complete when the student has recited the amount agreed upon at the start of the term, having demonstrated the ability to apply the rules of tajwid to the standardized and acceptable level.

TAJ 501: Tajwid Ijazah Track

The ijāzah in the Holy Quran is a certification which recognizes that the bearer has recited the Holy Quran from start to finish with complete application of the rules of tajwid and authorizes its bearer to teach and pass on the same ijāzah in turn. The Ribaat Quran ljazah will be issued by the Ribaat Academic Institute and authorized by the Ribaat Tajwid Committee.

Through this program, students will work individually with their instructors to memorize and recite the Holy Quran from start to finish and will learn Al-Jazariyyah, a poem dedicated to the science of tajwid, as well as other requirements as assigned. Each student will be paired with a certified tajwid teacher, either online or locally, with whom she will work one-on-one.

ARABIC

New

Arabic Language Program

The primary focus of this program is on developing learners' abilities in reading and understanding written texts in Arabic, with a focus on classical/ liturgical materials. Subsidiary focus will be paid to developing learner skills in speaking, listening, and writing, all of which contribute to meeting the primary aim of the program.

Whilst students from all backgrounds are welcome to take this program, it is designed specifically for those who come from non-heritage backgrounds. Students who have had little to no exposure to the Arabic language prior to starting the program will be invited to begin at the Novice level.

Students who have studied or learned the language will be required to take a placement test in order to determine the appropriate level at which they should commence the program. Students from heritage backgrounds are also welcome to take a placement test in order to determine whether or not they would benefit from the content offered and if so, which level would be appropriate for them to join.

The Ribaat Arabic Language Program is structured into 3 levels: Novice; Intermediate; and Advanced, based on the first three levels of the ACTFL framework. Each of these levels is further split into 3 bands: Beginner; Middle; and High. A set number of modules will be required to progress from one band to the next, and to qualify for a level.

For Novice, the completion of three modules is required in order to pass the level. For Intermediate, nine modules are required (three modules per band). For Advanced, six modules are required (two per band). The entire course therefore consists of 18 modules. Each module will be offered twice a year subject to demand and teacher availability.

Each module will span 6 weeks. During each of those 6 weeks, students will be asked to attend two synchronous classes pf 1.5–2 hours each. They will also be asked to complete work on three other days of the week via three asynchronous sessions. This can also be viewed as independent work set by the teacher. In total, the week will consist of 3–4 hours of synchronous class time, and approximately 3 hours of asynchronous class time. This is designed to help our students develop sound knowledge of the language and develop their skills effectively so that they can move through the levels swiftly and effectively.

ARL 111: Arabic Novice Beginner

This is the first course in the Ribaat Arabic Language Program. It is designed to equip learners with the skills to read (phonetically decode) and write the Arabic script with vowels and provide them with a range of high frequency vocabulary which they can use in their reading of Quranic texts and to offer greetings in Arabic.

ARL 121: Arabic Novice Middle

This is the second module in the Novice level. This course involves an introduction to the basics of Arabic grammar of nouns, with an emphasis on building learners' reading skills and basic vocabulary knowledge to allow them to read the Quran and recognize key words and phrases, as well as introduce themselves.

ARL 131: Arabic Novice High

This module introduces students to the basics of forming sentences in Arabic. This includes verbal and nominal sentences. Students will be introduced to the methods for conjugating simple verbal roots. By the end of the module, learners will be able to read and understand containing simple texts familiar vocabulary, as well as construct their own nominal sentences about simple themselves, their families, and their homes.

ARL 211-213: Arabic Intermediate Beginner

There are three modules under Intermediate Beginner band. In the first level, students will be introduced to constructing verbal sentences in the past, present, and future tenses. They will work on developing this skill to include positive and negative sentences and learn how to ask questions. In second level, students will build on their knowledge of nominal sentences by learning how to negate them and situate them in the past tense. They will also learn how to express possession and how to identify and construct dual and plural nouns. In the final level, students will build on their knowledge of verbs and verbal sentences by exploring different tenses and moods. This will equip students with an ability to read and understand more complex texts. Students will learn how to express emotions as well as their hopes and aspirations.

ARL 221-223: Arabic Intermediate Middle

There are three modules Intermediate Middle band. First, students will expand their knowledge of verbs through an introduction to hollow roots and the 10 verb forms. They will also learn how to construct and describe opposites, and building on their knowledge of vocabulary related to the human body, they will learn how to discuss issues around health and wellness using vocabulary found in classical/ liturgical as well as more modern texts. In the second level, students will focus in depth on the 10 verb forms. They will learn how to recognize and construct each form, as well as infer the meaning of each. They will be building on their knowledge of tenses and moods by applying them to each of the forms. In the third level, students will expand their knowledge of verbal and nominal sentence construction and translation by covering particles, and active and passive participles, adverbs, relative pronouns, and be introduced to passive verbs.

ARL 231-233: Arabic Intermediate High

three modules There under are Intermediate High band. First, learners will start to explore more complex features of the Arabic language. This includes the construction of noun-number phrases, diptotes, doubled roots and the jussive, as well as how to recognize and construct passive expressions. Students will apply their knowledge to reading about and discussing the topic of religion and religious practices and will explore how to justify their thoughts and opinions using vocabulary found in classical/ liturgical as well as more modern texts. In the second level, learners will expand the range of verbs they can conjugate by adding weak-end roots and examining the orthography of the letter hamza. They will also learn how to construct different types of conditional sentences, and noun-number phrases for numbers 11-99. In this level, learners will consolidate the knowledge and skills accumulated throughout the previous modules and expand their repertoire by examining the construction of exceptive sentences and noun-number phrase for numbers above 100. Learners will apply their knowledge and skills to understanding discussing the topics of history, political systems, and peace and conflict in the Arab world around the globe using vocabulary found in classical/ liturgical as well as more modern texts.
